Star Repeater:





VE Testing 9AM January 20th

Exam Session Time: exam sessions start at 9:00 AM.

Exam Location: Columbia Power and Water Systems (CPWS) Training Room, 201 Pickens Lane, Columbia TN 38401. (Note: You cannot access CPWS from Highland Avenue so be sure to look for the sign on Pickens Lane).

We only offer in-person exam sessions at this time.

What to Bring: \$15 exam fee (if not already prepaid), your FCC Regisration Number (FRN), and a photo ID. If you are an existing license holder upgrading to General or Extra, please bring a copy of your current license (not the CSCE). You may bring a calculator, but you must clear the memory prior to taking your exam. Cell phones may not be used as calculators, and must be turned off prior to starting the test. We will provide pens, pencils, and scratch paper. The initial \$15 exam fee pays for one attempt at each of the three exam elements. If a candidate fails an element at an exam session and wants to re-test for the same element, an additional fee will be required. Exam fees will only be refunded if we are forced to cancel the session due to circumstances beyond our control inclement weather, power outage, etc.

Effective April 19, 2022 the FCC will charge a \$35 fee for NEW license applications (not for upgrades to General or Extra class). This fee will be paid directly to the FCC

once you pass your exam; we do not collect this fee at the test session.

Callsign Lookup History

The "Flying Horse" Radio Amateur Callbook, in hard copy telephone book format. had been providing listings of amateur radio callsigns since the early 1920s. However, modern technology led to its demise in 1997. Then its resurrection in a CD-ROM format until 2002 when the plug was pulled on the CD-ROM. The first edition of the callbook appeared some time around 1920 or 1922 until it was discontinued in 1997. It listed all callsigns alphabetically.

When I was a Novice (1964) I



would sometimes go to the library which had a CallBook in their reference section. It wasn't much use to me as the Novice license was only good for a year and with the CallBook not being new, most of the guys I wanted to lookup weren't in the book. I don't remember ever buying a Flying Horse Callbook but my bride (KF4YOJ) tells me otherwise.

Next came the CD ROMs. The first one I bought was put out by RT-Systems in Huntsville. It had a DOS based interface (before Windows) and was very popular. Before the internet as we know it today, QRZ published a CD Rom which sold well. QRZ eventually came out with a Windows interface that worked with Windows 95. During this same period the World Wide Web was born and on October 28, 1993, QRZ went online with http://www.qrz.com and a web based callsign lookup server. QRZ holds the distinction of being one of the first 5,000 websites in existence (there are many millions today). 73 Bill K4BX
